As fall approaches and more and more people fill the sidewalks in downtown Auburn, remember that sidewalks are for pedestrians.

Per city and state code, sidewalks within Auburn's Downtown Business District are a scooter-free zone. This also applies to bikes, skateboards, skates and other similar devices. Their speed, coupled with dense pedestrian traffic, makes the combo a recipe for disaster.

Please keep our sidewalks and roadways safe for all this fall by following the rules of the road! And remember, violators can be ticketed.

The Downtown Business District's boundaries are Glenn Avenue on the north, Gay Street on the east, Thach Avenue on the south and College Street (from Thach to Magnolia) and Wright Street (from Magnolia to Glenn) on the east.

Labor Day closures & schedules

Most City facilities will be closed on Monday, Sept. 2, in observance of Labor Day. Public Safety services including police, fire and communications will remain on their regular schedules. Garbage, trash and recycling collection will be delayed by one day throughout the week.

The Auburn Public Library's book drops will remain open, and the online collection of e-books, e-audiobooks and digital magazines is always available at auburnalabama.org/library.

Downtown parking will be free except for the Wright Street Parking Deck.

All Parks and Recreation facilities will be closed except for Samford Pool and the Yarbrough Tennis Center, both of which will be open during regular hours.

It's your average Saturday at Kiesel Park: the tennis balls and Frisbees are flying at the large- and small-dog runs, shady trails host plenty of runners, walkers and cyclists, and a 250-person wedding is getting underway at the pavilion.

Well, that may not be quite the average Saturday at the park, but the City of Auburn's 124-acre park at 520 Chadwick Lane is host to a growing number of weddings in the spring and fall. The southwest Auburn park is a favored spot for those looking for a beautiful, nature-focused venue without the

Kiesel Park has been host to about 12 weddings in 2024 as of mid-July, and it has hosted 43 weddings in the past two years. Rentals are busiest in the spring and pick up again in the fall.

Jennifer Burch, Auburn Parks and Recreation administrative technician, handles park reservations for the department and said on July 17 that reservations for May 2025 had begun to come in. Weekend rentals usually remain available for prime spring weather until about January or February, she said.

In addition to the greenspaces and mature trees that make it a great natural venue, Kiesel Park is a flexible spot for weddings. Guests have the option to rent (or not rent) the outdoor pavilion, the community building and the historic Nunn-Winston House during their celebrations.

"They can choose any or all of those for their event. The pavilion is a great location for the actual ceremony — that's what we see most often," Burch said. "The community building is indoor and has tables and chairs that can be used."

The community building and its catering kitchen makes for a convenient staging area for receptions. As a historic property, there is no food or drink allowed in the Nunn-Winston House, but bridal parties often use it to prepare for their ceremonies.

While the two buildings have capacity limits — 75 for the community building and 50 for the Nunn-Winston House - the outdoor area of the park itself is open and can accommodate basically any size wedding. If Kiesel can host Auburn CityFest, it can accommodate your group.

Kiesel Park is the only City park where renters can stay after normal operating hours — until 9 p.m. on a weeknight or midnight during the weekend.

That flexibility also means there are some special considerations to make if you're planning a wedding at Kiesel Park, Guests are responsible for setup and breakdown of seating and tables, and tents, catering and other additions must be rented separately. Rental companies must be on the guest's permit for the event ahead of time.

Special additions and vendors must be cleared with Parks and Recreation staff at least 60 days before the ceremony. Alcohol is permitted for receptions at the park only with permission of City staff, liability insurance, potentially an ABC license depending on the event, and a member of the Auburn Police Department must be present during the

The other two things to remember when planning a wedding at Kiesel Park don't have much to do with rules or regulations: the weather and other people.

"Weather is often a consideration," Burch said. "In the case of rain, we do have concessions in place for that for the outdoor facility. We can cancel, if we need to, and reschedule."

And, of course, Kiesel Park remains open to the public during any special event at reserved areas. If you're planning photos at a beloved spot in the park, remember that your party may not be the only people there.

But after those I's are dotted and T's crossed, wedding parties are free to make their ceremonies what they will at the park.

"It's a beautiful venue. It's a great, affordable option for people," Burch said. "We welcome people to ask for our reservations, and sign up, and we wish them luck."


- · Remove all valuables from your vehicle each time you leave it.

A better way to get rid of used cooking oil

Over the years, we've kept more than 18,400 gallons of used cooking oil and grease out of the City's sewer system through our Fats, Oil and Grease (FOG) Recycling program. And you can help us collect even more!

Our Water Resource Management Department began the FOG Recycling program in 2009 to bring awareness to and reduce the harmful effects of improper disposal of grease and used cooking oil. Remember — oil should never be poured down the drain. Even if it is poured slowly down the drain with hot water, this will eventually cause problems with your plumbing and the City's sewer system.

Through the program, you can responsibly recycle used grease and oil by picking up a free container from the Recycling Drop-Off Center at 365-A N. Donahue Drive. Once the container is full, bring it back to the drop-off center to be properly disposed. A grease renderer turns the recycled oils into raw materials that can be used in animal feeds, pet food and industrial formulations.
