SOCCER COMPLEX ROUNDABOUT

Construction of a new roundabout is underway at the entrance to the Auburn Soccer Complex on Wire Road. The new roundabout will help improve access to and from the Auburn Soccer Complex and will improve the efficiency and safety of all traffic flow on Wire Road. The project is expected to last through March 2023.

Lane closures are expected throughout the project, and traffic control measures will be in place to help drivers navigate the closures. Please use caution if you're traveling in the area during work.

Keep these tips in mind when using a roundabout:

- · Slow down.
- · Yield to pedestrians and bicyclists.
- Yield to circulating traffic when entering.
- Use turn signal to indicate intent to exit.

Why a roundabout? Roundabouts reduce serious injury and loss of life crashes as well as traffic congestion. According to the Federal Highway Administration, roundabouts typically reduce all collisions by 37% and reduce crashes with injuries by 75%.

Please note, unforeseen circumstances and weather could cause construction delays. Thank you for your patience as we complete this needed upgrade to the infrastructure in this area!



Get a free tree this Arbor Day

Celebrate Arbor Day by contributing to Auburn's tree canopy! The Auburn Tree Commission and Auburn Public Works will hold their annual Arbor Day Celebration on Saturday, Feb. 25. Swing by the Kroger on Dean Road, Publix at Moore's Mill or Publix at Cary Creek to pick up a free Eastern Redbud or White Oak seedling — free while supplies last! Planting instructions will be included with each seedling.

The Tree Commission is made up of Auburn residents who are appointed by the Auburn City Council. The commission advises the City on proper tree care and planting and is committed to the growth and preservation of the urban tree canopy.

The National Arbor Day Foundation has recognized the City of Auburn as a Tree City USA for the last 38 years. In addition, the City of Auburn received the Tree City USA Growth Award for the fifth-consecutive year, highlighting innovative programs and an increased commitment to urban forestry.

City links university research with local manufacturer to further innovation

From concept to production, the City of Auburn's Economic Development team helps foster, develop and expand Auburn companies. This often involves connecting them with the resources they need to take the next step.

The department recently did just that, linking a researcher with a longstanding Auburn company to turn an idea into a reality.

A few years ago, Dr. John Beckmann with Auburn University received a grant to develop a textile knit that could block mosquitoes' ability to bite through clothing. The City's Economic Development team offered Beckmann space in the City's incubator system for him and his research team to work.

"To take Dr. Beckmann's innovative research a step further, we introduced him to STRAEHLE+HESS, a German textile manufacturer in our Auburn Technology Park South that could help support the research team's commercialization efforts," said Arndt Siepmann, deputy director of the City's Economic Development Department.

This introduction quickly turned into a fruitful collaboration.

"Having STRAEHLE+HESS share their knowledge and experience with textiles, their supplier base and their help in repairing and operating machines has been pivotal for our research team," Beckmann said. "With their help, we've been able to develop a production-ready material."

Together, they have made significant progress in developing a life-changing knit pattern that keeps mosquitoes out. This development could help prevent the spread of deadly diseases such as malaria, zika, dengue and others.

STRAEHLE+HESS also helped the research team create a plan for commercialization, helping move the product out of research labs and into the marketplace.

"This project is a perfect example of the collaboration between university research and commercial expertise," said Corinna Luz, chief sales officer at STRAEHLE+HESS. "As a manufacturer, we're always looking for projects that fit our business model and offer opportunities for growth. We're pleased to be part of a project that gives us a chance to work with the university while developing a new innovative product."

Beckmann's production line is now graduating out of the City's incubator after three years and moving into STRAEHLE+HESS's facility, creating an environment where students and faculty can work alongside industry experts to develop the product. This move will allow researchers to analyze textiles and test their product's effectiveness on site. The City's Economic Development team hopes this collaboration will be another example of the successful commercialization of a research idea here in Auburn.

BURN AWARENESS WEEK scald prevention tips

This February, Auburn Fire is teaming up with the American Burn Association to help spread awareness about burns and how we can all take steps to avoid them. Feb. 5-11 is National Burn Awareness Week, and this year's theme is scald injuries.

Scald burns can happen at any age, but children, older adults and people with disabilities are at a higher risk. Hot liquids from bath water, hot coffee and even microwaved soup can cause devastating injuries. Scald burns are the second leading cause of all burn injuries.

So how can you be proactive and prevent these burns?

- Teach children that hot things can burn.
- · Consider installing anti-scald devices on tub faucets and shower heads.
- Always supervise children in or near a bathtub. Test water at the faucet to make sure it's below
- 100 degrees Fahrenheit, and test the water before placing a child in the bath.
- Place hot liquids and food in the center of a table or toward the back of a counter to prevent spills.
- Have a 3-foot kid-free zone around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried
- · Open microwaved food slowly and away from your face.
- · Don't hold a child while cooking, drinking a hot liquid or carrying hot foods or liquids.
- Never heat baby bottles in a microwave use warm water from the faucet instead.
- Allow microwaved food to cool before eating.

If you are ever burned by a scalding liquid, treat the burn right away. Cool the burn with cool water for three to five minutes then cover with a clean, dry cloth. Get medical help if needed. Always dial 911 in an emergency.
